new Incorporated Societies Act. The new constitution will introduce time-frames for the President which will have a term of a maximum of 7 years.


This is a good opportunity for me to step aside and let somebody else have a



150 YEARS OF TRAINS ATHELENSVILLE

The Helensville Railway Station Trust has been a member of FRONZ for many years and is planning to celebrate the 150th anniversary of trains running to Helensville on October 4 and 5 this year. Scott Osmond details the rich life of Helensville's transport hub.

A small group representing the Railway Station Trust, Te Awaroa (Helensville) Museum, and North West Country Business Association is in the early stages of planning for the event. Watch this space!

The railway from Riverhead to Helensville was opened in October 1875, with direct rail access from Auckland to Helensville in 1881, when the Awaroa Stream in FRONZ

Helensville was bridged and a new

railway station and yards opened on the present station site. Helensville remained the terminus of the line until the route to Kaupakakapa was opened in 1889.

The present station was built in 1880, further west of its present location. In 1881 a Post Office was added which operated until 1911. The station was moved east to its

present site in 1927, and the main line was also moved further east, which



removed a curve. In 1980 it was closed as an officered station when the last passenger train to Auckland stopped running.

In 1983, part of the southern end of the building was unfortunately demolished. All of the expected ancillary structures once existed at Helensville, including Goods Shed, Engine Shed, Coaling and Water facilities, stockyards and also timber loading facilities. A turntable was in place from 1908 until a turning triangle was built in 1942.

This triangle is no longer used due to storm damage and is disconnected from the KiwiRail network. Refreshment Rooms were added in 1923, and 12 railway cottages were also built nearby.

The Helensville-Dargaville ferry service continued until the railway went through to Dargaville in 1942 and the Port of Kaipara was officially closed in 1947.

The Northland Express ran on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from when the line was opened to Whangarei in 1923 until 12 November 1957, after which Fiat railcars ran a daily service until they were withdrawn on 31 July 1967.

A commuter train to Auckland ran Monday to Friday until it too was withdrawn on 18 August 1980. An unsuccessful attempt at restarting a commuter train ran for 18 months in 2009-2010 was made but was cancelled due to lack of patronage. Sadly, it was very slow due to the work being undertaken on the Western Line at that time and other issues including the once only daily service.

It is fair to say it was ahead of its time as the areas between Westgate and Helensville have grown considerably, as have traffic problems, during the intervening years.

An efficient rail service would be well used no doubt should it be re-instated.

In the early 1990s, local County Councillor, the late Arnold Gosling, knew the value of the station to the local heritage.

Mr Gosling and began to preserve it and develop it as a place for passing tourists to call for refreshment and information. He



arranged for the station and a significant amount of surrounding land to be subdivided and purchased outright from the then Railways Corporation.

The ownership is now in the hands of the Helensville Railway Station Trust, which aims to preserve it, and keep the community informed and involved with the life of the station.


Visiting excursion trains were, until recently, also encouraged and there have been visits from several rail heritage operators either passing through while heading north or staying over in town.

For a number of years, a special train was run to the annual Santa Parade in Auckland using the now redundant suburban diesel units.

Unfortunately, the demise of the turning triangle has limited access for steam engines and KiwiRail has also stopped the use of the entire North Auckland Line north of Swanson for passenger trains, despite spending a lot of money and effort in upgrading the line.

Much work has taken place including repiling, painting, replacement of the platform and parts of the station roof. Also drainage, fencing and kerbing around the access road, sealing and marking the parking area. In order to fund the necessary maintenance and running costs the Trust has leased parts of the building out.

At present, the railway station building (which dates back to 1881), houses tenants compromising of a Cafe, Local Arts and Crafts Gallery.

The Trust has been gifted a large working railway model, which was constructed by the late Mr Ross Hughes of Auckland, and depicts the railway station and its environs including many heritage buildings as they were in the 1950s and 1960s.

and as such is a true and accurate replica of this historic era. All items of this model were constructed by hand by Mr. Hughes over many years and it is his wish that it be made available for public display.

The Trust, in 2013, built a new building as a museum to house this model and also our historical collection of railway artifacts and information including working train control Tyers Tablet Machines.

For any traveller north of Auckland wanting a change from State Highway One, the route via State Highway 16 with a call at Helensville is a pleasant diversion. The museum currently opens Sundays from 10.30am to 3pm and the café and shops are open Tuesday to Sunday.


Volunteers at the East Coast Museum of Technology are working hard ahead of their next Live Day, writes president Harrison Hill.

Over the past few months, we've made significant progress on our railway infrastructure as part of our ongoing site upgrade programme: Recent upgrades include the full asphalting of the Matawhero Railway Station, with new rubber ramps set to be installed soon for improved accessibility access.

Additionally, both track crossings leading to the station will be upgraded, making the railway site more accessible for visitors and volunteers alike.





We have lifted our Davenport locomotive onto our main tracks after being on an isolated line for some years, in preparation of moving it under cover.
